Donations still needed to brighten up Phelps Hall!



Though our Italian Dinner is two weeks away, we thought you would like to know that the vestry has decided to designate 10% of our proceeds from the dinner to support the work of the No Freeze Shelter in Willimantic! Please keep the Shelter – its personnel and its clients – in your prayers as we give thanks for the work it does in providing warm and safe shelter to the homeless in our area.

It may feel chilly but the Grass is Growing!!

The Building & Grounds Committee is looking for volunteers to help with cutting the grass at the Church/Phelps Hall and at the Rectory. A riding lawn mower, self-propelled hand mower, and a gas trimmer are kept in the sheds at Phelps Hall and at the Rectory (yes, one set for each location) for your use. Gasoline is also stored in both sheds. We will gladly give you some orientation with the equipment so that you'll find it easy to operate. It takes approximately 2 hours at either location



for one person to do, and about ½ that time for two people. We have had some couples volunteer, so feel free to talk your spouse into helping. We're asking that people volunteer to mow one of the locations a total of two times over the mowing season (May-October). Mowing is usually completed late in the week (Thursday, Friday or Saturday) at your convenience (several of the volunteers choose to mow after work). You will be provided a key to the shed so you may come and go as you please. We draft up a schedule for the entire mowing season, taking into account vacations and other unavailable time for each of the volunteers. The draft schedule is sent to all volunteers for a final review. This way, each volunteer will know weeks or months in advance of their schedule. Volunteers will have a list of contact phone numbers and emails in case an unexpected issue comes up, so they may switch mowing dates. Please feel free to contact Curt Kraemer (860-537-4517) or Rick Marks (860-228-3833) without feeling that you're going to have to say yes. Please feel free to contact any member of the Building and Grounds Commission as well. Please give this some consideration. We're only talking about 4 hours of your time over a six month period.

The Readings for the 7th Sunday of Easter

The First Lesson: Acts 16:16-34

With Paul and Silas, we came to Philippi in Macedonia, a Roman colony, and, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation." She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour.

But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe." The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks. About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" They answered, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.

The Second Lesson: Revelation 22:12-14,16-17,20-21

At the end of the visions I, John, heard these words:

"See, I am coming soon; my reward is with me, to repay according to everyone's work. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end."

Blessed are those who wash their robes, so that they will have the right to the tree of life and may enter the city by the gates.

"It is I, Jesus, who sent my angel to you with this testimony for the churches. I am the root and the descendant of David, the bright morning star."

The Spirit and the bride say, "Come." and let everyone who hears say, "Come." And let everyone who is thirsty come. Let anyone who wishes take the water of life as a gift. The one who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am coming soon." Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all the saints. Amen.

The Holy Gospel: John 17:20-26

Jesus prayed for his disciples, and then he said. "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.

"Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them."

Today we celebrate Rogation Day!

Rogation Day is actually a series of three days preceding Ascension Day that are set apart by the Church to celebrate God's creation and ask God's blessing over the land as a new growing season begins.

It is a time for us to be reminded that we are stewards of creation and to reflect on the abundance of God's blessings in our lives.



Think of Rogation Day as the Church's Earth Day (only the church has been celebrating this feast for over 1500 years!). This year we honor Rogation Day on the Sunday after the Ascension with a Rogation Procession around St. Peter's Cemetery immediately following the service.

Prayers for the Rogation Procession

Prayer at the SE corner:

O heavenly Father, creator of the cosmos, who has filled the world with beauty: Open our eyes to behold your gracious hand in all your works; that, rejoicing in your whole creation, we may learn to serve you with gladness; and honor you as our Creator and source of all life. *Amen*.

Prayer at the SW corner:

Lord Jesus Christ, when you came among us, you proclaimed the kingdom of God in villages, towns and cities: Grant that your presence and power may be known throughout this land. Bless all who live and work to produce the food that nourishes us and the necessities of life that sustain us; give us thankful hearts to appreciate our abundance; awaken us to provide for those in need; and inspire us to honor the land and water from which all good things come. All this we ask in your holy name. *Amen.*

Prayer at the NW corner:

Almighty God, whose loving hand created all that surrounds us; in giving us dominion over all things on earth, you made us co-workers in your creation and stewards of your bounty: Give us wisdom and reverence so to use the resources of nature, that no one may suffer from our abuse of them, and that generations to come may continue to praise you for your bounty. *Amen.*

Prayer at the NE corner (Memorial Garden):

O God our heavenly Father, you have blessed us and given us dominion over all the earth: increase our reverence for the mystery of life; give us new insight to your purposes for the human race; inspire us with wisdom and determination to provide for the future of our world; and grant us courage and perseverance to bring your healing love to those who are suffering or in need; for the sake of the one who bore your love to us, Jesus the Christ, our Lord. *Amen*.
