Ringing Out Our Faith for 200 Years



During the holidays, one of the most recognized symbols of the season are bells. We see them in movies. Who could forget Clarence getting his wings in the 1946 classic, **It's A Wonderful Life** or the iconic image of Santa's sleigh bells and the innocence of childhood in the iconic 2004 **Polar Express?**We hear them in the music of the season from the 1950 Silver Bells or the much older Jingle Bells dating back to 1850 to celebrate Sleigh races in Medford, MA by songwriter James Lord Pierpont.

In our own village of Hebron, we have a bell that has rung out for nearly 200 years. Our St. Peter's church was built in 1826. In 1831 the bell tower was added. The bell was cast by George Holbrook Bell company of East Medway MA. George Holbrook was considered the third major bellfounder in America, after Aaron Hobart and Paul Revere.

The bell needed to be replaced in 1921. A new bell was cast by McNeeley Bells of Waverly, NY. The Meneely Bell Foundry established in 1826 by Andrew Meneely was one of the greatest bell makers in American History. More than 65,000 bells were cast under the Meneely brand between 1826 and 1951, when the business closed.

For all these years the bell has greeted the town on Sunday mornings announcing a new day and ringing out our faith. It reminds all within hearing of it to observe the Sabbath and give thanks for the God's abundance of our lives. Especially, in this frantic world in which we live hearing the clarion call of the bell is an invitation to pause, slow down and give thanks.

In our spiritual lives, the sound of bells serves as a beautiful reminder to gather in worship and praise. They invite us to come together and focus on our Creator. When we hear the call, it is God gently nudging us to come closer and deepen our faith. Worship is not just a gathering; it is a celebration of God's goodness, love, and grace. In this holiday season may we give thanks for the abundance of love bestowed upon us as represented in the joy and magic of bells.

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From the Altar Guild

What is the Tabernacle and the meaning of the Sanctuary Candle?

In the Anglican Church, the **Tabernacle** is often a lockable, attractive "box" used to store consecrated communion hosts and consecrated wine. These elements are also known as the "reserve" sacrament and are used in the church service if the priest should realize he needs more hosts than what he consecrated during the Eucharistic Prayer, and for taking communion to the sick or those unable to attend, perhaps due to immobility.

The term "tabernacle" is a reference to the Old Testament Tabernacle, which housed God's presence among the Israelites. In this context, it is a symbol of God's real presence on Earth with humankind.



The sanctuary candle ideally should be placed very near to the Tabernacle as the reserve sacraments are the holiest thing in the church when we are not there. It is the time-honored tradition of recognizing Christ's eternal presence in the church, in Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. It is a sign to those praying that Jesus is truly present.



The only day of the Liturgical year the candle is not lit is Holy Saturday when Jesus is removed from the Tabernacle as a reminder of His absence when He was in the tomb after His death on the cross.

When our much anticipated altar area reconstruction is completed, our Tabernacle and sanctuary candle will finally have a place of honor and respect, given it's significance.

At St. Peter's, parishioners may request that the candle burn on a particular Sunday in remembrance of their loved one, a meaningful way to recognize our continued love for those who have gone before us. The best way to reserve your desired date is to e-mail Claire at:
